



Competition terms and conditions

1. The Childnet Film Competition: International 2024 forms part of the Childnet Film Competition 2024, organised by Childnet International.
2. The Childnet Film Competition: International is open to young people aged 7–18.
3. The Childnet Film Competition: International is open to all young people who reside outside of the UK. There is a separate competition and entry process for UK entries.
4. The winning film will feature on the Childnet website and the UK Safer Internet Centre website, as well as being shared via Childnet and UK Safer Internet Centre social media channels.
5. In the interest of child protection and in accordance with Childnet's media consent policy, credits added to any film must contain first names only. Any films that contain full names in the credits cannot be considered for the competition. Please refer to Childnet's privacy policy for more information.
6. All films entered into the competition must be overseen by a supervising adult to ensure the film content and copyright terms have been adhered to.
7. Only films submitted with a completed entry form and signed consent form for all participants can be entered into the competition.
8. Completed films and forms must be entered under the terms outlined in the competition packs and on the main Childnet Film Competition webpage.
9. Film entries must be sent in by 5pm on Monday 22nd April 2024 (the closing date of the competition).
10. Schools can enter more than one film so long as the participating children for each group are different.
11. Each group can be up to 8 people, including those behind the scenes.
12. All film entries must be no longer than 2 minutes. This time frame must include title sequences and any credits.
13. All films entered into the Childnet Film Competition: International must be in the English language or contain English subtitles
14. Any film entered into the Childnet Film Competition: International must feature appropriate, non-offensive content or language.
15. All films must respect copyright law. Any film using copyrighted material (e.g. music, imagery or footage) must obtain written permission from the copyright holder and provide this information with the film entry.
16. Any film using royalty free or bought music must be referenced with your film entry. You must include the name of the artist and the name of the song.
17. To maximise the learning opportunity of the project, filming and production should be the work of the young person/people taking part.
18. The winning prize is intended as a school prize with the purpose of purchasing filmmaking equipment for the school. All film entries must clearly state the name of the supervising adult and the name of the school on the entry form.
19. Childnet reserves the right to change the prize from that advertised.
20. Winners of all categories will be announced on the Childnet website in June, after the finalists' event.
